Oysterponds Historical Society Receives Generous Grant from Robert David Lion Gardiner Foundation of New York

Oysterponds Historical Society (OHS) is pleased to announce that it is a recipient of a Digital Tapestry grant of \$125,000 from the Robert David Lion Gardiner Foundation (RDLG). OHS will join several other Long Island historical societies on the 1776AR Trail, including Shelter Island Historical Society and the Raynham Hall Museum in Oyster Bay, among others.

The grant will support an Augmented Reality Experience that will explore the dynamic and complicated history of the American Revolutionary War on Long Island's North Fork. It will be designed by the US-based 360XR, a company with deep experience in bringing technology, history, and education together.

Founded in 1944, the Oysterponds Historical Society (OHS) is a not-for-profit 501(c)(3) organization that celebrates the culture and heritage of the North Fork of Long Island, NY. OHS maintains a campus of seven historically-significant buildings located in the heart of Orient's landmark historic district.
